"Biblical leaders do not just react to the future; they discern what God is doing, prepare organizations for multiple possibilities, and faithfully steward influence regardless of the environment."

Introduction

Opening Question

"What assumptions about the future are shaping your decisions today?"

Many leaders unconsciously assume tomorrow will resemble yesterday.

History repeatedly demonstrates otherwise.

Examples:

- COVID-19

- Disruptive Technologies
- Economic disruption
- Geopolitical instability
- Revival movements
- Online Ministry Influencers

The leaders who thrive are not necessarily the smartest.

They are the ones who by spiritual discernment prepare for multiple futures.

Biblical Foundation

1 Chronicles 12:32 (ESV)

"The men of Issachar had understanding of the times, to know what Israel ought to do."

Notice:

They did not only understand current events.

They understood:

- trends
- timing
- strategic action

This is Biblical foresight.

Part I – What is Strategic Foresight?

Strategic planning asks:

"Where are we going?"

Strategic foresight asks:

"What kinds of futures might emerge?"

Futurist Jim Dator, considered one of the founders of futures studies, argued that nearly every future scenario fits within four broad categories.

These are not predictions.

They are mental models.

They help leaders avoid strategic blindness.

Biblical Example

Joseph interpreted Pharaoh's dream.

He did not simply explain it.

He prepared Egypt for multiple seasons.

Genesis 41:33–36

Leadership is not simply predicting.

Leadership is preparing through informed discernment and strategic decision making.

Everything continues to improve.

Economic growth

Technology

Most organizations naturally assume this future.

Leadership Characteristics

- Expansion
- Innovation
- Scaling
- Investment
- Hiring

Biblical Example

Israel under Solomon

- National prosperity

- Economic expansion
- International influence

1 Kings 10

Executive Reflection

Questions:

- Are we preparing for growth?
- Can our systems scale?
- Are leaders being developed faster than the organization grows?

Leadership Danger

Assuming growth never ends.

Proverbs 27:1

"Do not boast about tomorrow..."

Future Two: Collapse

Definition

Existing systems fail.

Possible causes:

- Economic crisis
- War
- Moral collapse
- Institutional corruption
- Organizational failure
- Leadership scandal

Biblical Example

Jerusalem's destruction

Jeremiah repeatedly warned leadership.

Most ignored him.

Jeremiah 6:16

Executive Leadership Principle

Healthy organizations prepare before crisis.

Not during crisis.

Modern Organizational Questions

- What if funding disappears?
- What if attendance declines?
- What if regulations change?
- What if key donors leave?
- What if AI changes our workforce?

Biblical Principle

Noah built the ark before rain.

Genesis 6

Future Three: Discipline

Definition

Society intentionally slows growth.

Stability becomes more important than expansion.

Examples

- Sustainability
- Simplicity
- Local economies
- Reduced consumption
- Organizational efficiency

Leadership Application

Instead of asking:

"How can we become bigger?"

Ask:

"How can we become healthier?"

Biblical Example

The Early Church

Acts 2

Shared resources

Community

Stewardship

Generosity

Mission

Growth was measured differently.

Executive Leadership Questions

- What truly creates value?
- What activities should stop?
- Where are we wasting resources?

Scripture

Luke 14:28

Count the cost.

Future Four: Transformation

Definition

A disruptive innovation changes everything.

Examples

- Artificial Intelligence
- Internet
- Social Media
- Biotechnology
- Spiritual revival
- Major cultural shifts

Transformation changes the rules.

Biblical Example

Pentecost

Acts 2

The Church was born and the Gospel would go global.

The Holy Spirit continually transformed history through revival and reformation cycles.

Leadership Application

Transformation requires:

- imagination
- courage
- experimentation
- humility

Executive Questions

- What assumptions no longer work?
- What if our industry changes completely?
- What if our ministry model becomes obsolete?

Scripture

Isaiah 43:19

"Behold, I am doing a new thing..."

Part III – Biblical Discernment Beyond The Four Futures

The Four Futures model is descriptive.

Scripture adds another dimension.

The Holy Spirit.

Christian leaders do not simply analyze trends.

They seek divine wisdom.

James 1:5

John 16:13

Romans 8:14

The Holy Spirit gives discernment beyond data.

Kingdom leadership integrates:

- Strategic analysis
- Prophetic insight
- Biblical wisdom
- Prayer
- Community discernment

Executive Leadership Applications

Ask Your Executive Team

1. Which of the Four Futures are we unconsciously assuming?
2. Which future would most threaten our mission?
3. What indicators suggest change is already happening?
4. What capabilities should we develop today?
5. What is the Holy Spirit saying about our next season?

Leadership Challenge

High-performing leaders do not attempt to predict one future.

They prepare organizations to remain faithful under every future.

Kingdom leaders understand:

Growth is not guaranteed.

Collapse is possible.

Discipline produces health.

Transformation creates opportunity.

The mission remains unchanged.

The methods must remain adaptable.

Executive Leadership Tool: Wind Tunneling or Stress Testing Your Organization

In strategic leadership, wind tunneling means testing a strategy against multiple plausible future scenarios before making major decisions.

This process moves leaders from prediction to preparation.

Wind Tunneling/Stress Testing Through The Four Futures

Take one strategic initiative, for example, launching a new church campus, expanding internationally, implementing AI technology, or making a major capital investment—and evaluate it through each of The Four Futures.

1. Growth

- If our organization experiences rapid expansion, does this strategy scale effectively?
- Do we have sufficient leadership capacity, financial resources, and organizational systems?

2. Collapse

- If funding declines, regulations change, or a major crisis occurs, does this strategy remain sustainable?
- What contingency plans should we develop?

3. Discipline

- If society prioritizes stewardship, simplicity, or reduced consumption, does this initiative continue to provide value?
- Can we accomplish the mission with fewer resources?

4. Transformation

- If disruptive technologies, cultural shifts, or spiritual revival fundamentally change our environment, how adaptable is this strategy?
- What assumptions might no longer be valid?

Biblical Example

Joseph's Preparation for Egypt (Genesis 41:25–36)

Joseph effectively "wind tunneled" Pharaoh's future. Rather than planning only for years of abundance, he tested Egypt's strategy against an alternative future—seven years of severe famine. Because he prepared for multiple conditions, Egypt not only survived the crisis but became a source of provision for surrounding nations.

Likewise, **Noah** built the ark before the flood (Genesis 6), and the **sons of Issachar** understood the times and knew what Israel should do (1 Chronicles 12:32). Biblical leaders consistently prepared for changing conditions rather than assuming present circumstances would continue indefinitely.

Executive Leadership Application

Before approving any major strategic initiative, ask your leadership team:

- How does this decision perform under each of The Four Futures?
- What assumptions are we making that could prove false?
- What early warning indicators should we monitor?
- What adjustments would make this strategy more resilient across multiple futures?
- How are we seeking the Holy Spirit's wisdom as we evaluate these possibilities? (James 1:5)

Leadership Principle

Strategic foresight is not about predicting the future, it is about building organizations that remain faithful, resilient, and mission-focused regardless of which future unfolds.

By combining wind tunneling with biblical discernment, executive leaders cultivate organizations that are both strategically prepared and spiritually responsive, enabling them to lead with wisdom, adaptability, and confidence in an increasingly uncertain world.
